### Completion Requirements

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**HMRT-1003. Introduction to Human Rights**

Introduction to Human Rights course covers the history and development of human rights, the role of international law, and the impact of human rights on global politics and society. The course also explores the challenges of human rights in the 21st century and the role of individuals and organizations in promoting human rights.

**HMRT-1203. Global Politics (POLS 1603)**

Global Politics course explores the international system, including the role of states, international organizations, and non-state actors. The course also examines the impact of globalization on international relations and the role of human rights in global politics.

**HMRT-2013. Research Methods**

**HMRT-2223. Political Economy of Women (ECON)**

**HMRT-3203. Human Rights Advocacy through Social Media (COPP)**

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**HMRT-3263. Sex, Science & Gender (STS 3303)**

This course explores the intersection of science, technology, and gender. It examines how scientific and technological advancements have shaped and been shaped by gender roles and norms. Topics include reproductive technologies, genetic engineering, and the impact of digital media on gender identity.

**HMRT-3273. Feminism and Techno-Science (STS 3503)**

This course examines the relationship between feminism and techno-science. It explores how feminist theory has been used to critique and challenge the dominant narratives of scientific progress and technological innovation. Topics include the gender division of labor, the impact of automation, and the role of science in the development of artificial intelligence.

**HMRT-3283. Science, Religion, and Galileo's Trial (STS 3063)**

It focuses on the famous trial of Galileo Galilei as a case study, examining the clash between heliocentric astronomy and the geocentric model of the universe. The course also discusses the broader implications of the trial for the relationship between science and faith.

**HMRT-3433. World Literature in English: West Indies and Africa (ENGL)**

This course surveys world literature in English, with a focus on the West Indies and Africa. It examines the literary and cultural contributions of writers from these regions, exploring themes of identity, race, and post-colonialism. Key authors and works are discussed in detail.

**HMRT-3503. Moot Court (POLS 3403)**

This course provides students with practical experience in legal reasoning and advocacy through moot court exercises. Students are assigned to represent either the prosecution or the defense in simulated court cases, where they must research the law, analyze legal issues, and present their arguments orally.

**HMRT-3513. Moot Court**

This course continues the practical training in legal reasoning and advocacy provided in HMRT-3503. Students participate in additional moot court exercises, focusing on developing their skills in legal research, analysis, and oral presentation.

This course provides further opportunities for students to engage in moot court exercises, refining their legal skills and preparing them for future professional practice.
