SOCI-1006. Introduction to Sociology

Grade level: Freshman

SOCI-2416. Inequality in Society (WS/GS)

This course examines the social and economic inequalities in Canadian society. It explores the causes and consequences of these inequalities, including the role of class, race, and gender. The course also examines the role of the state in the creation and maintenance of these inequalities. Topics include: income inequality, wealth inequality, social mobility, and the role of the welfare state.

SOCI-2423. Social Problems I - Sociological Perspectives (WS/GS)

This course introduces students to the study of social problems from a sociological perspective. It examines the social, cultural, and political contexts of various social problems, including poverty, crime, and mental health. The course also explores the role of the media and public opinion in the construction of social problems.

SOCI-2433. Social Problems II - Canadian Social Problems (WS/GS)

This course examines Canadian social problems from a sociological perspective. It explores the social, cultural, and political contexts of various social problems, including poverty, crime, and mental health. The course also explores the role of the media and public opinion in the construction of social problems. **Prerequisites:** SOCI 2423.

SOCI-2443. Racialization, Racism & Colonialism

This course examines the processes of racialization, racism, and colonialism in Canadian society. It explores the social, cultural, and political contexts of these processes, including the role of the state and the media. The course also examines the impact of these processes on various social groups, including Indigenous peoples, people of African descent, and people of Asian descent. **Prerequisites:** SOCI 2423.

SOCI-2513. Sociology of Communication

This course examines the relationship between communication and society. It explores the social, cultural, and political contexts of various communication processes, including mass media, interpersonal communication, and digital communication. The course also examines the role of communication in the construction of social reality.

SOCI-2523. Sociology of Aging (WS/GS, GERO 2113)

This course examines the social and cultural contexts of aging in Canadian society. It explores the role of age in the construction of social identity and the experience of aging. The course also examines the impact of aging on various social groups, including women, people of African descent, and people of Asian descent. **Prerequisites:** SOCI 2423.

SOCI-3153. Sociology of War

The course will examine the social, cultural, and political dimensions of war. Topics include the social construction of war, the role of the state, the impact of war on society, and the experience of war. The course will also explore the role of war in the development of the modern world.

SOCI-3173. Women and Education

This course examines the relationship between women and education. It explores the historical and contemporary roles of women in education, the impact of gender inequality on educational outcomes, and the role of education in promoting gender equality. The course will also discuss the role of women in the development of the modern world.

SOCI-3183. Sociology, the Self & the Other

This course explores the relationship between the self and the other in sociology. It examines the role of the self in social interaction, the impact of social structure on the self, and the role of the other in the construction of the self. The course will also discuss the role of the self and the other in the development of the modern world. Topics include: (1) The Self; (2) The Other; (3) The Self and the Other; (4) The Self and the Other in the Modern World; (5) The Self and the Other in the Postmodern World; (6) The Self and the Other in the Global World; (7) The Self and the Other in the Digital World; (8) The Self and the Other in the Environmental World; (9) The Self and the Other in the Health World; (10) The Self and the Other in the Aging World; (11) The Self and the Other in the Disability World; (12) The Self and the Other in the LGBTQ+ World; (13) The Self and the Other in the Immigrant World; (14) The Self and the Other in the Refugee World; (15) The Self and the Other in the War World; (16) The Self and the Other in the Pandemic World; (17) The Self and the Other in the Climate Change World; (18) The Self and the Other in the Artificial Intelligence World; (19) The Self and the Other in the Space World; (20) The Self and the Other in the Future World.

SOCI-3223. Globalization and Gender (WS/GS)

This course examines the relationship between globalization and gender. It explores the impact of globalization on gender inequality, the role of gender in the development of the modern world, and the role of globalization in promoting gender equality. The course will also discuss the role of globalization in the development of the modern world.

SOCI-3243. Sociology of Men and Masculinities (WS/GS)

This course examines the sociology of men and masculinities. It explores the historical and contemporary roles of men in society, the impact of gender inequality on men, and the role of men in the development of the modern world. SOCI-3263. Capitalism and Modern Culture

SOCI-3323. Sociology of Women and Law (WS/GS)

This course examines the relationship between women and law. It explores the ways in which law is created, enforced, and interpreted, and the impact of law on women. Topics include the history of women's rights, the role of women in society, and the impact of social change on women's rights.

SOCI-3413. Employment Equity Policy and Gender Inequality at Work (WS/GS)

This course examines the relationship between employment equity policy and gender inequality at work. It explores the ways in which employment equity policy is created, enforced, and interpreted, and the impact of employment equity policy on gender inequality at work. Topics include the history of employment equity policy, the role of employment equity policy in society, and the impact of social change on employment equity policy.

SOCI-3513. Sociology of Education

This course examines the relationship between education and society. It explores the ways in which education is created, enforced, and interpreted, and the impact of education on society. SOCI-3523. Sociology of Knowledge
